



Optional Iron-on Horsepower Application Instructions

Apply before using the cover.

Please follow the steps below if you would like to add the option HP numbering to your cover. We have supplied a small additional swatch of fabric to practice (please use one of the numbers you do not need) prior to applying the actual number to your cover. **We strongly suggest you do a trial as once applied the lettering cannot be removed.**

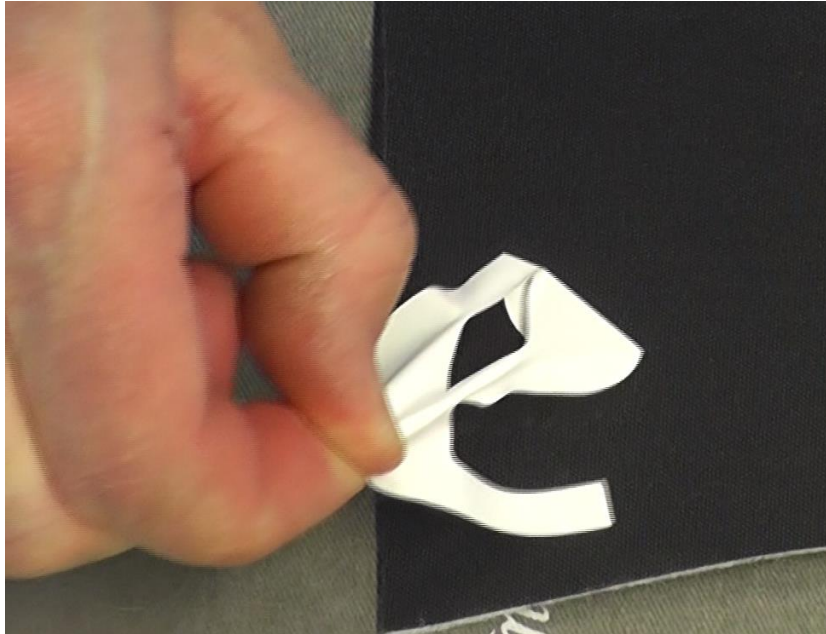
1. Set a standard domestic iron to the medium heat setting (1/2 way on the dial which is between WOOL SILK on most irons).
IMPORTANT:- TURN OFF ANY STEAM SETTINGS.
2. The cover has a chalk line on the rear showing where the HP NUMBERS should be applied. Place this section on the end of the ironing board making sure the fabric is flat & crease free.
3. Gently iron over the area where the numbers are to be attached. This will remove any residual moisture. **TAKE CARE NOT TO IRON OVER ANY STITCHING, MESH, ELASTIC or PRINTING (including OCA Logo).**
4. Select the required HP and align the bottom of the numbers with the chalk line. **DO NOT REMOVE THE PROTECTIVE CLEAR FILM.**
5. Once you are happy with the position and alignment you can use the iron to attach the numbers.
6. Use a medium pressure and move the iron from side to side for 15-20 seconds. Make sure you apply even pressure to the entire transfer.
7. **ALLOW TO COOL BEFORE PEELING** the clear protective film gently back. If the numbers appear to lift, stop peeling, replace the film and repeat from step 5 above. You may need to increase the temperature and pressure SLIGHTLY.
8. Once cooled, clean any residual chalk marks off the fabric with a damp cloth.

DO NOT APPLY HEAT TO THE NUMBERS WITHOUT THE PROTECTIVE FILM.
